**Introduction and Context**

Blaenhonddan Community Council provides a range of services to its local community which have an impact on biodiversity. These include:

- Responsibility for a number of green spaces including 6 parks / playgrounds, 2 playing fields, 8 allotments and 2 other parcels of land, in respect of which it reviews and adapts its management practices where appropriate
- Liaising with and supporting a number of community groups in its area who are involved in environmental matters.
- Helping to raise awareness of biodiversity and environmental matters by supporting or organising relevant events.
- Providing funding where possible for projects in the Council's area which impact on biodiversity.

The Council promotes sustainability and biodiversity by pursuing sustainability goals and sustainable practices whenever possible. It is subject to the Well-being of Future Generations (WFG) Act and produces an Annual Report which addresses sustainability and biodiversity, with an annual update provided to the Neath Port Talbot Public Service Board on meeting sustainability objectives. The primary reporting responsibility rests with the Clerk to the Council, with policy decisions determined by Council and individual Members contributing to implementation as appropriate

The Council serves approximately 11,000 residents in the communities of Bryncoch, Waunceirch, Caewern, Cadoxton, Cilfrew and Aberdulais. The precept for 2025-2026 is £303,503

Many ideas have been generated and their inclusion in a structured context through the Biodiversity Action Plan has helped to monitor progress and deliver implementation. Understanding that this is a “duty” that falls on the Community Council and that there are reporting obligations has been absorbed in the Council’s work programme. Officers manage interactions and Members engage with partners and take ownership of project delivery.</li> <li>• The Biodiversity Action Plan has been adopted by Council and will be used to monitor progress. Whilst regular meetings of the Environment Committee have not occurred, Council has received regular reports and the S6 duty is monitored through the BAP.
